

2007 Health Manpower Survey on Chiropractors

Key Findings

- The chiropractors covered in the 2007 HMS were chiropractors registered with the Chiropractors Council of Hong Kong under the Chiropractors Registration Ordinance (Chapter 428) as at the survey reference date - 31.8.2007.
- The number of chiropractors covered in the 2007 HMS was 94.
- Of the 94 registered chiropractors covered, 57 had responded to the survey, giving an overall response rate of 60.6%. Of the 57 responding chiropractors, 52 (91.2%) were economically active*[†] (active) while five (8.8%) reported to be economically inactive*[‡] (inactive) in the local chiropractic profession (*See Chart*).
- All the 52 active chiropractors were practising in the local chiropractic profession.
- The survey findings presented below were based on the 52 responding chiropractors who were practising in the local chiropractic profession as at 31.8.2007. As some questionnaires contained missing information, percentages presented below may not add up to 100%.
 - (i) Among the 52 active chiropractors enumerated, 43 (82.7%) were male and nine (17.3%) were female, giving an overall sex ratio of 478 (males per 100 females). The median age of the 52 active chiropractors enumerated was 41.0 years.
 - (ii) Distribution by sector of the main job[§] showed that all the 52 active chiropractors enumerated were working in the private sector. Among them, 32 (61.5%) were in solo practice and 20 (38.5%) were in group practice.
 - (iii) The median number of hours of work (excluding meal breaks) per week of the 52 active chiropractors enumerated was 40.0 hours. Four (7.7%) chiropractors were required to undertake on-call duty in their posts, and their median number of hours of on-call duty (excluding normal duty) per week amounted to 27.5 hours.
 - (iv) All the 52 active chiropractors spent most of their working time on service in chiropractic.
- The five inactive chiropractors reported practising overseas / in the Mainland (*See Chart*).

* In the survey, the criteria used in defining economically active/inactive followed those recommended by the International Labour Organization, which are also being used by the Census and Statistics Department in Hong Kong.

[†] “Economically active” chiropractors comprised all “employed” and “unemployed” chiropractors. “Employed” chiropractors referred to those chiropractors practising in the chiropractic profession in Hong Kong during the survey period, while “unemployed” chiropractor referred to the chiropractor who (a) was not practising in the chiropractic profession during the survey period; (b) had been available for work during the seven days before the survey; and (c) had sought working in the local chiropractic profession during the 30 days before the survey.

[‡] “Economically inactive” chiropractors comprised the chiropractors who were not practising in the chiropractic profession in Hong Kong during the survey period, but excluding those who had been on leave during the survey period and those who were economically active but “unemployed”.

[§] Main job refers to the job in which the chiropractors had spent most of their working time.
